The Department continues to provide excellent police services and opportunities to collaborate with our citizens to address community and crime related issues.


This annual report provides only a snapshot of the hard work and dedication by the employees of the Winston-Salem Police Department.

In 2016, the Winston-Salem Police Department will continue to work with our community partners to build trust, reduce crime, and improve the quality of life for all our citizens.



# Winston-Salem Police Department


Winston-Salem is in Forsyth County, which is located in the North Central Piedmont region of North Carolina. It has an estimated population of 237,885 and covers approximately 133 square miles.

The Winston-Salem Police Department provides a full range of police services to residents and visitors to the City. The Department is authorized 570 sworn and 166 non-sworn employees. It has four major components: Office of the Chief of Police, Field Services Bureau, Investigative Services Bureau and Support Services Bureau. 


Assistant Chief Wilson Weaver is the commander of Field Services Bureau and oversees Patrol and Special Operations Divisions.

The Patrol Division provides 24 hour a day response to calls for service through regular patrol coverage in three geographically designed police “districts.” Each district has two “zones,” with four police “beats” in each zone, for a total of 24 beats citywide. Dividing the city into small geographic beats for deployment purposes assists with reducing our response times to emergency calls for service.

“Emergency” calls are defined as “All calls with a significant threat of imminent injury to persons, and calls that involve crimes against person(s) and house/store breakings that are in progress or just occurred and the suspect is still there.” Our stated goal for response to “emergency” prioritized calls is within 6 minutes. For 2015, our average response time to “emergency” prioritized calls was 4.9 minutes.

Many units such as the Downtown Bike Patrol and the Traffic Enforcement Unit, within the Special Operations Division, assist the Patrol Division with daily operations. In addition, many of the specialized units are subject to call out incidents such as traffic fatalities, hostage situations, improvised explosive devices and other high risk incidents.



## 2015 Part One Crimes by District




In District One, patrol personnel responded to 33.7% of citywide calls for service and were responsible for 36.2% of self-initiated activity.







## 2015 Part One Crimes by District















The mission of the Winston Salem Police Department Special Weapons and Tactics Team is to provide the city of Winston Salem with a highly trained unit to respond to and resolve critical and dangerous incidents exceeding the normal capabilities of patrol, investigatory, and other units within the police department. The SWAT team will respond when traditional police methods and operations may not successfully resolve the situation without exposing the participants to undue risk. The goal of the Winston Salem Police Department SWAT Team is to resolve such incidents, whenever possible, in a coordinated manner with the least amount of risk and vulnerability to citizens, victims, other involved parties, team members, and perpetrators.



The K-9 Unit is comprised of 10 K-9 teams, all of which are dual purpose trained in human odor recognition and narcotics. The K-9 Unit provides investigative assistance to Patrol Officers and the Criminal Investigations Division. Three K-9 teams are assigned to the Special Investigations Unit for narcotics detection.

The K-9 teams assist in the everyday operations of the department. The K-9s are high quality, well-trained members of our department. The K-9 handlers are highly motivated and dedicated Police Officers.

The K-9s are regarded as a specialized locating tool. The K-9 teams are utilized to conduct narcotics and article searches, building searches, tracking of suspects and missing persons, and apprehension of suspects.

The K-9 Unit also conducts public education demonstrations to promote and educate the community about the K-9s and crime prevention.





# Traffic Enforcement Unit



# Honor Guard



The Honor Guard Unit consists of members from various squads and divisions of the Winston-Salem Police Department. The Honor Guard (HG) Unit seeks to respectfully and considerately provide tribute and appreciation to those who selflessly give to others in the field of Public Safety.

In addition to their regular assignments, the members of the HG volunteer their time to take on the task of memorializing Police, Fire and Military service and sacrifice at approximately 70 ceremonies each year. These ceremonies consist of presenting colors, funeral details, playing taps, singing the National Anthem, and Fallen Officer Ceremonies for the Winston-Salem Police Department.

The HG Unit often works with other agencies for local, state and national events throughout the year. Major annual events include September 11th memorials and National Police Week, held in the month of May in Washington, D.C.

# Special Events & Permits



The Special Events Coordinator acts as the departmental liaison to citizens and businesses requesting extra-duty police officers for private security purposes and issues permits for parades, pickets, block parties and open air events. Duties also include preparing and coordinating all special event plans, managing overtime signups for patrol augmentation, creating event plans, and organizing post assignments for special events (such as the Dixie Classic Fair, National Black Theatre Festival, dignitary visits, as well as cycling events and charity runs).

During the calendar year of 2015, both on-duty and extra-duty officers were assigned to work 179 permitted events. This office assisted in the management of 25,665 extra-duty jobs/shifts worked by 471 participating officers, totaling 81,216 extra-duty work hours.



# Investigative Services Bureau

Assistant Chief Catrina Thompson is the commander of Investigative Services Bureau and oversees the Special Investigations Division, and Criminal Investigations Division.

Investigative Services personnel respond to on-scene investigations of major crimes, and investigates crimes referred from the Patrol Division.

Investigative Services Bureau consists of 127 sworn and 8 non-sworn personnel.


# Criminal Investigations Division

# Domestic Violence



In 2015, the Winston-Salem Police Department was awarded a Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) grant through the Governor's Crime Commission for a Domestic Violence Detective. As a result, a new Domestic Violence Detective position was added to the Special Victims Unit in the Criminal Investigations Division.

The Special Victims Unit and the Victim Assistance Unit launched a large Domestic Violence Awareness Initiative, which ran throughout the entire month of October. The Domestic Violence Awareness Initiative featured 17 new Silent Witness Silhouettes. Each of these silhouettes represented someone who lost their life to domestic violence and bore a shield to tell their story. Each Silent Witness was sponsored by a business in the community, and the sponsor displayed their silhouette at their business throughout the month. All of the proceeds were donated to a local shelter to provide resources for victims of domestic violence.

Mayor Allen Joines proclaimed October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month, and a program was held at Winston-Salem City Hall to commemorate the start of this campaign. Family Services of Forsyth County also led a candle light vigil.

All marked police vehicles displayed a purple ribbon magnet throughout the month of October. Police Department employees, not in uniform, wore purple ribbons. Several buildings and streets in the downtown Winston-Salem area also bathed their buildings with purple lighting during the month of October.



# Educational Services Unit

## SRO /Super Kids



The Educational Services Unit is also part of the Criminal Investigations Division. This unit is comprised of the School Resource Officer (SRO) and the Super Kids programs. There is also a dedicated K-9 officer assigned to this unit. The K-9 assists with random contraband checks in the schools and parking lots.

The School Resource Officer (SRO) program is designed to provide school administrators and staff with law enforcement resources and expertise in order to maintain safety and order in the school environment. The program is also intended to promote positive relationships, crime prevention and educational activities, mentoring opportunities, and accessibility of the SRO to parents, students, school personnel, and the community. The SRO's frequently participate in, and attend, sports activities, dances, and other school sponsored events after normal school hours. The relationships formed between the SRO's, students, and Administrators is instrumental in making appropriate referrals to partnering organizations within the community, where students can receive assistance, based on their needs. The SRO Unit provides on-site police services to 8 High Schools and 12 Middle Schools within Winston-Salem. In 2015, the School Resource Officers handled a total of 1,823 calls for service while school was in session.

The SUPER KIDS program provides comprehensive prevention strategies for all ages, targeting Kindergarten, 2nd grade and 5th grades. Topics taught in 2015 included bullying, peer pressure, positive decision making, and respect for others, as well as emotional and physical wellbeing. During 2015, the SuperKids Unit provided services to 43 Elementary Schools within Forsyth County. All lessons are age appropriate, grade sequential, and attempt to target and prevent future adolescent problem behaviors.




# Support Services Bureau

**Index Crime (Part One)** includes the total number of violent crimes (murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault) and property crimes (burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft). In 1999, the Winston-Salem Police Department began to report crime data based on categories and definitions conforming to Incident Based Reporting (IBR) standards in which all crimes per incidents are reported. The following charts and tables report all crime using the IBR method. The total number of victims is counted in murder, rape, and aggravated assault. The total number of incident charges is counted in robbery, burglary, and larceny. The number of vehicles stolen in each incident are counted in motor vehicle theft.


Note: The index crime data is provided yearly to the State Bureau of Investigation (SBI). The SBI converts the index crime data back to the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) standards in which only the most serious crime is reported according to UCR hierarchical reporting. Therefore, crime figures listed for Winston-Salem that are published by the SBI and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) will be different than what are listed in this document.

# Murder

and non-negligent manslaughter is defined as the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. The classification of this offense, as in all of the other crime index offenses, is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Not included in the count of this offense classification are deaths caused by suicide, accident, justifiable homicide, and attempts to murder, which are scored as aggravated assaults.

**2015 Location of Murder**










Five Year Robbery Trend











On January 17, 2015 Corporal D. G. Smith and Officer D. W. Smith responded to a single vehicle accident on Silas Creek Parkway. Communications advised there was a single vehicle that had left the roadway and was in Peters Creek.

Corporal D. G. Smith and Officer D.W. Smith were the first to arrive on the scene. They discovered that the involved vehicle had left the roadway and traveled down an embankment where the vehicle landed on the driver's side in Peters Creek. The driver's side of the vehicle was under several feet of water.

Corporal D. G. Smith and Officer D.W. Smith detected a strong odor of gas coming from the vehicle. The officers immediately entered the water to attempt to rescue anyone in the vehicle. Corporal D. G. Smith and Officer D. W. Smith extracted the driver and were able to move him out of the frigid water. Once at the bank of the creek they discovered that the driver did not have a pulse. They began administering chest compressions until EMS arrived. Officers re-entered the frigid water in attempts to check for any additional victims.

In recognition of their professionalism and quick action in the performance of their duties Corporal D. G. Smith and Officer D. W. Smith clearly demonstrates their commitment to excellence which exceeds department standards.


